Do You Recognize These People?

While Ruthie was working on some old, original papers at the Brewer House she came across this old letter... really turned out to be seven pages of a poem... obviously written by a mother.

She writes: "I assumed it to a Goodwin - as it was with some other pieces, one envelope marked E.O. Goodwin (who was it appears a town officer, and first Fire Chief in town).... there is no name to or from or by, or even a date on the poem sheets.

"I just checked the two books, Goodwin's and Paquette's and I can't find which Goodwin was a Dr. ... which according to the poem lines I copied - obviously "he" was. ... so I guess it's not an Edward afterall ??

"SO without knowing WHO exactly - I thought we could still put this into the newsletter to share - but also share that we are trying to figure out who wrote it. I believe it to be from the Goodwin family. Can anyone help?

"It appears to be part of a collection from Edward (Edmund) Goodwin and his wife. it's a seven-page poem about LIFE – that she obviously wrote in her later years.

"I think this is something that we might eventually do something with; perhaps publish it for sharing or a program later down the road. For now I'd like to share a couple of verses that jumped out at me with our members.

"(about the husband)

At least Old Yale did send him forth, too wise to be a Proctor As he resolved he could not preach, to be the Village Doctor. His mind of course to study best, to learn the healing art, To understand the system well, in every sense and part.

"(the daughter - s)

The next a daughter as it seems, was added to the list-

Who is after years when called upon, was willing to assist,
In household matters, cook and wash, or juveniles attending
And Harriet learned to be kind and spin as well as do the mending

"When two more years had passed away, the eldest age was four, Another daughter as it proved, was added to the store.

Althea her duty's done and this a somewhat arduous task,

Saw the children all leave home, and she went too, at last.

NEWS BRIEF FROM SAVANNAH, GEORGIA

Old East Hartford Colonial Starts New Life Welcoming Visitors to Savannah

We have learned of the removal of the old, uninhabited white colonial house which was located at approximately 215 High Street in East Hartford (near the Hockanum School) to its new location in Savannah, Georgia. It was purchased for the empty lot next to the lovely Printmaker's Inn in Savannah and will add 5 guest rooms to that inn. It is now called the Hills-Galloway House. The Hills name refers to a distant connection between the present owner and the house's original Connecticut owners. Most of this house dates from the 1740s but part of it has wood dating from the 1690s. This is intriguing as this earlier date makes part of this house older than the city of Savannah itself (founded in 1733). Also intriguing was the discovery on one wall, hidden under a covering, of a 6' hand drawing of a scene from the French-Indian War (1754-1763). This in itself may be unique as no one, at least in Connecticut, had ever heard of anything like this.
