HISTORICAL SOCIETY HOLIDAY OPENING AT THE SELDEN BREWER HOUSE With Comments on One Visitor's Special Interest in the Old Round House

During the first two weekends in December when we greeted visitors to the Selden Brewer House holiday exhibits, it was a pleasure not only greeting fellow members of the Historical Society but also non-members who saw our notice in the *Gazette* or on social media. Two couples who visited on the first Saturday were welcomed just as we were closing. One guest who lives close to the town railroad yard near Park Avenue offered to send us some before and after pictures of the 1888 Roundhouse that burned in a fire on April 16, 1997. Those photos are included. The railroad yard was once the largest employer in East Hartford. The old east of the river line out of Hartford now ends at School Street, no longer extending to Manchester with the closing of the Central Conn. Co-op in 2016. The only active line now in East Hartford runs along route 5 into South Windsor. Thanks to Carl Weber for these pictures and others that will be a part of our folder on the railroad roundhouse.

RUTH SHAPLEIGH-BROWN IS LOOKING FOR INFORMATION ON ALBERT RAYMOND AND HIS FINANCES

Ruthie has been recently contacted by an old AGS colleague from Michigan (Association for Gravestone Studies) .. regarding a book he's working on about old cemetery family vaults. Seems he heard about the Raymond Family vault at Center Cemetery. Ruthie has been trying to do some research to get him more information about "how Mr. Albert C. Raymond" came about his wealth, but so far has only found a reference that he was a farmer and GOOD businessman. He owned the land that is now the Central Ave. area, of East Hartford, and generously gave to help establish and improve the area, in most respects to preserve it as a parklike area. The Raymond family was from Montville area previously, and the Raymond Library Company; which established what is now our Raymond Library on Main and Central streets in 1885. He also established the same in the town of Montville where they were previously lived. Ruthie has more to learn but is familiar with the family surname in that area and has worked with some family descendants in the past. One of the most extensive records of the history of the Montville area was done by a Mrs. Raymond. Ruthie found information in Paquette's East Hartford History.

..."In 1877 under the impetus of Albert C. Raymond the Village Improvement Society had formed, with 128 original members. Its objectives included improving and ornamenting streets and public grounds, planting and caring for trees and shrubs, cleaning and repairing sidewalks and crosswalks, and any other projects to beautify the town. Henry R. Hayden was president, George H. Goodwin, first vice-president, and Mr. Raymond, treasurer."

You can read more about this "Improvement" time in the book <u>Only More So - The History of East</u> <u>Hartford 1783-1976</u>, by Lee Paquette, copies are available at the Raymond Library or can purchased at the Historical Society for \$10.00.
